Hope Looks Forward – Lives Forward

During Advent I shared from the pulpit that hope, "...the conviction of things not seen" (Heb 11:2), is rooted in that which is to come, not in the restoration of some pristine past to which we seek to return. It is important to study our historical past, primarily to learn from our errors and seek greater justice and peace in the world. Yet the primary expression of spiritual hope as we begin the new calendar year is a forward view, looking toward that which is to come, in this world's experience and the divine mystery of the eternal.

I am cautious of movements that seek to "go back," or to use the language of Juergen Moltmann, the "repristination" of a past that was imperfect and likely marked with injustices we seem to repeat in each generation. We can't change the past, but we CAN look forward, inspired by the Gospel, to a way of life characterized by reconciliation and justice.

Moltmann wrote in 1967 that "God continues to come to us from the future, giving us new visions and revelations of what can be. God's Kingdom is already present among us through the coming of Jesus...but its fulfillment remains in the future" (*Freed to Love and Live Again, p. 57*). I believe we can move toward a more peaceful world when each of us *lives forward*, inspired by a Gospel that chooses not to repeat our histories of retribution and "getting back" at our enemies, but identifying the injustices that lead people to rage and violence. We can "live forward" in 2024 by supporting and doing ministries in our community and beyond that bring about new beginnings, for individuals and even between nations.

Living forward means care for self and others. Moltmann taught in his writing that to live without hope is to cease to live. One needs hope to get up in the morning, to exercise and nourish oneself, physically and spiritually. I live forward for the people I love most, those of my own family and the congregation I serve.

Finally, I believe God weeps with us in our sorrows here so that in the mystery of that which is to come, we will laugh together with our Creator in the Church Triumphant. In the coming year and beyond, let us live forward in the hope that the Kingdom of God begins now, and moves toward the peace that is beyond understanding.

Faith University: A History of the Middle East Guest Scholar, Dr. Ali Atabey, Assistant Professor of History, UTSA Sundays, 9:30 a.m. to 10:15 a.m. Dates for the class: Jan. 7, 14, 21, 28

This lecture series delves into the history of the Middle East from the early 1800s to the present day. Although it will touch upon past centuries to provide context, its primary focus is on the modern era. It explores various forms of modernity in predominantly Muslim regions, European imperial expansion, the emergence of anti-imperial movements, the impact of World War I on the Middle East, the rise of nation-states, and contemporary social, political, and economic developments. The series concludes with analyses of the present and future of the region. Dr. Atabey earned his doctoral degree at the University of Arizona with a dissertation entitled, "Crossing Borders in the Early Modern Mediterranean: Identity, Religion, and Space in Seventeenth-Century Ottoman Galata." He is currently configuring his dissertation into a book. Some of the courses he teaches at UTSA include Introduction to Islamic Civilization, The Ottoman Empire, The Modern Middle East, and Piracy and Captivity in the Early Modern Mediterranean.

Confirmation for 6th to 8th grade students instills the basics of faith, connects youth to their Lutheran heritage, and continually reminds them of the love and grace of God. Our Christmas Bazaar featuring CLC artists and crafters who donated their works and 100% of the proceeds to benefit our friend Brenda was a huge success. Our goal was to raise \$1K to help Brenda pay off her predatory lending loan. We raised about \$1,500 and were very excited until the day after the Bazaar when the perils of poverty once again reared their ugly heads. Brenda was in a car accident. It was her fault. She does not have car insurance (because she cannot afford it), and she owes the other guy \$1,600 to repair his car. Her own car looks like someone dropped a bomb on it. Replacing it so that she can go to work presents another enormous financial woe. Her trials seem never-ending, and yet, miraculously, this congregation keeps lending loving support, lifting her up as she's about to crash.

By the way, the reason she owes a predatory title loan is that the State of Texas has taken away her food stamps and despite repeated reapplications, they keep denying her. She needed money for food and took out an outrageous title loan. For food. To feed her children. Poverty is horrid, as are the predators who take advantage of the poor.

Enormous thanks and gratitude to Beth Callaghan, Linda Cornwell, Jen Dunn, Sue Garcia, Patti Lynch, Mary Overstreet and her sister Nell, and Dorothy Woods for their generous artistic contributions, to the church staff for their assistance, and to our congregation for turning out with money in hand to buy our artists' wares and lend their support to Brenda.

We will continue to help Brenda and her children because that's what a Jesus-abiding congregation does.

Christ Lutheran of Alamo Heights has a long history of partnership with Habitat for Humanity – helping this amazing organization build affordable homes for low-income families in our community. As a member of the South Texas Lutheran Cluster since 1999, we have joined with brothers and sisters from 11 ELCA churches to construct comfortable, modest new homes that bring pride and joy to the owner families.

The San Antonio Habitat for Humanity office was the first affiliate in the nation to be formed, and since 1976, it has helped organize and build over 900 homes in the area. They are proud to note: "We were the start of it all: we built the first Habitat home in the world!" It is an ecumenical Christian non-profit housing organization. They bring people together to build homes, communities, and hope, working with families who would not otherwise be able to afford a home. The families are engaged in the work, thus supporting the organization's maxim, "We are not a charity or a 'handout' program, but rather we help families help themselves."
