From the Pastor...

For a while – for life – forever

This year, as Pastor Leslie imposed ashes on my very large forehead on February 14th, reminding me “you are dust, and to dust you shall return,” I thought of those things that are just for a while, other things that are for life, and that which is truly forever.

When Ash Wednesday ended, the black cross on my noggin was eventually gone, either worn off or cleansed before bed. The ashes were just “for a while.” Many of the things that cause us such concern and sometimes stress are really just “for a while.” What clothes we will wear, what purchases we may make, or even our busy work schedules are just for a while, for the day will come when “... the busy world is hushed, the fever of life is over, and our work is done” (ELW, p 284). The just “for a while” concerns can sometimes feel overwhelming, but Lent is a reminder of the temporal nature of such things.

There are also lifelong matters and relationships. Commitments we make and oaths we take can often remain with us as long as we have breath. When one becomes a mother or father, it is not just until one’s offspring reaches the age of majority. Daughters and sons remain ours for life, and a parent never ceases to love and feel concern for their children’s well-being. When one commits to marriage or becoming a baptismal sponsor to another’s child, nurturing such relationships remains a lifelong endeavor as well. Some things truly are for life.

Above all our concerns in human experiences are those mysteries that transcend time and empirical measurement. They will be fully understood only in eternity. Lent is the time when we order our priorities and concerns, looking toward that which is to come. I may stress about work responsibilities, but one day my work will be finished. I love my children and grandchildren and pray for them daily, demonstrating my love for them as often and vigorously as I can; but again, they grow up ... and away. Time and life’s limitations will cause us to “let them go” with passing years and the reality of mortality.

That which is forever is the Lenten assurance that God will never let us go but promises on Good Friday even to the thief on the cross: “Today you shall be with me in paradise” (Luke 23:43). The Bible is truly the book of promises, made again and again to the children of Israel as they wandered in the wilderness, went after “other gods,” and failed to attend to the

voices of the prophets. Yet again, in Jesus, God came among us, endured crucifixion, yet rose again with the forever promise to all.

Lent is our opportunity, together as a community of faith at CLC, to sort out the “for a while” matters of life, those that are “for life,” and look forward to the “forever” that empowers us to love and service. For it is in that love and service that we glimpse the “forever” of God’s infinite grace.

Faith University, Sunday Mornings, 9:30 a.m., Fellowship Hall

March 3 and 10

Retired pastor and member of Christ Lutheran, the Rev. Paul Ziese, who served MacArthur Park Lutheran Church, just down the road from us, for 22 years, graces Faith University with his teaching during the month of March. He writes the following about the class he is offering that began in February and continues March 3 & 10:

What can Lutherans do to resist the rise of authoritarian rule in the United States? How can we use our biblical understandings, doctrines, and history to support the preservation of American democracy?

In 2019, the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America sent me as part of its delegation to Berlin, Leipzig, and Wittenberg to help celebrate the 30th anniversary of the end of the Cold War, and the bringing down of the Berlin Wall. Over several days, we met with participants of the Silent Revolution, and international scholars to discuss how American Lutherans could use their faith tradition to avoid the suffering endured by Germany and other European nations.

I will discuss what I have been doing for the last five years, and what we might do together. Access to a Lutheran Study Bible and Evangelical Lutheran Worship would be helpful.

The **Welcome Team** offers hospitality to visitors and new members, and hosts visitor coffees and receptions to embrace and include newcomers into our congregation.

Healing Prayer meets on second Tuesdays in the Rode Prayer Chapel for a short spiritual reading, Holy Communion and anointing, and silent "soaking" prayer.

Our **Stewardship Team** gathers to discern how to share with our congregation the important faith practice of stewardship. Serving on this team is by invitation, but if you're interested, please talk to Pastor Leslie or Casey Passant.

CLC's 2024 Lenten Theme: "Again and Again"

In Partnership with Inner City Development

Our Lenten theme, "Again and Again," speaks of the many people and places in our world and our community that are broken and continually suffering. Food insecurity is one of the critical socio-economic issues that defies a solution. No matter how diligently caring organizations work to feed those in need, many remain hungry. Children in our community are especially at risk, with one in five children in Bexar County living with food insecurity.

On San Antonio's near West side, there's a robust ministry serving the poorest zip code (78207) and the poorest precinct in Bexar County. Since 1968, Inner City Development has served as a bustling sanctuary for its neighbors. The ministry provides food, clothing, basketball leagues, summer programs, socialization, holiday celebrations, and the trusted hand of friendship and counsel to more than 1,000 families each year.

Inner City's emergency food pantry provides mostly non-perishable foods to 50 to 60 families every month – 45,000 meals each year. They serve sack lunches to some 35 homeless Monday through Saturday. And in the summer, their indoor and outdoor spaces are bursting with hundreds of happy children who attend a 7-week program that extends through June and July. Games, sports, cooking, crafts, field trips to parks and recreational venues, and cooling swims in Inner City's above-ground pool are highlights of the FREE event, and the children and teens get a hot meal and snack every day. Teens who want to participate must sign up for leadership training that prepares them to help run the program.

Inner City Development is a true community center, and it owes its life to the community founders, program leaders, and other staff, all of whom are volunteers, including the directors, Patti and Rod Radle. The continuance of passionate volunteers has been the heart and soul of this mission since its inception, and none have ever collected a salary. Except for a part-time receptionist, the center is run entirely by volunteers – many from the neighborhood, as well as churches and other supporters who are proud to be a part of this model community gathering place.

Inner City Development is one of our annual benevolence partners, and we are humbled by their selfless outreach to a neighborhood that Patti Radle refers to as, "economically challenged but culturally rich." We admire their selfless ministry and recognize the empowering, hope-giving, life-enriching breadth of their work.

Your 2024 Lenten offerings are designated to Inner City Development to help them feed their neighbors, as Jesus would have us do. Every dollar helps satisfy a hungry tummy, brings comfort and nourishment, and proves Again and Again that when Jesus calls us to action, this congregation listens and responds with His Love.

Holy Week at CLC

Palm Sunday Services will be held March 24 at 8:30 a.m. and 10:30 a.m. with livestream at the 10:30 a.m. service. Pastor H will preach. We celebrate Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem even as it points hauntingly to his ultimate betrayal, trial, crucifixion, and death. Palm processional, Holy Communion, and the passion reading will be at both services. A donkey will join us at 10:30 a.m. service.

Palm Sunday Celebration for Children's Sunday School

Join us in the courtyard on March 24 at 9:30 a.m. for a special story of Palm Sunday. Children and families can hear the story of Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem. We will have games, a special snack, and pictures with a real, live donkey!

Maundy Thursday Service is a solemn and beautiful worship on March 28 at 7:00 p.m. in person and via livestream. Pastor Leslie will preach. This service, which includes Holy Communion, leads us to reflect on Jesus' Last Supper with his disciples. Here, gathering at the table and watching as Jesus kneels to wash the disciples' feet, we receive the absolution that was denied us on Ash Wednesday and the great commandment from Jesus that we love one another as he has loved us.

Good Friday Tenebrae Service on March 29 at 7:00 p.m. in person and via livestream will be a unique combination of scripture and music led by our talented and dedicated music staff and Sanctuary Choir.

Easter Services will celebrate our Lord's triumph over death through resurrection on Sunday, March 31, at 8:30 a.m. and 10:30 a.m. with livestream at 10:30 a.m. Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! The services are nearly identical, although the 10:30 a.m. service will include a children's message. Pastor Leslie will preach at both services, and both will include Holy Communion. Don't forget to bring flowers to place on the Resurrection Cross! An Easter Breakfast will be offered between the services, beginning at 9:15 a.m. Please join us as we celebrate!

Resurrection Flowering Cross

Christ Lutheran bursts into color with flowering crosses on the church lawn on Easter morning. The flowering cross is an especially striking and beautiful way to symbolize the new life that emerges on Easter morning after Jesus' death on Good Friday. The rough-hewn wood symbolizes the heavy cross on which Jesus died. The contrast between the starkly bare cross and the colorful transformation, when it is adorned with living flowers, is a dramatic, visual representation of the new life we celebrate. On Easter morning, we ask you to bring cut flowers for each member of your family (and more if you'd like to share) to place on our flowering crosses. It's a way our whole congregation can participate in and visualize the gift of Easter Sunday. For our visitors (and those of us who forget), we'll have extra flowers.

Easter Breakfast & Easter Egg Hunt

Please join us for our annual Easter Morning Breakfast at 9:15 a.m. in the Fellowship Hall on March 31. Carolyn Dufelmeier will prepare fruits and pastries and requests contributions of breakfast casseroles from the congregation. CLC Benevolence Partners Corner **Chrysalis Ministries**

Chrysalis Ministries is an organization whose mission is to assist those who are currently incarcerated to have hope and a chance at a new life as they go forward. Incarceration is extremely difficult not just for those directly impacted but for entire families and support groups who are deeply affected as well. They all benefit greatly from the services Chrysalis offers.

Classes are available through Chrysalis on topics such as anger management, drug and alcohol abuse, and job readiness. Much-needed counseling services and pastoral care are essential offerings as well. While getting to know their clients, the facilitators also reach out to family members to provide support in similar ways to help the family when they reunite with their loved one.

Chrysalis provides as many resources as possible for the adults in the family to gain employment through job training and connections with employers. They have programs benefiting children including essentials such as new backpacks, school supplies and new shoes for every child at the beginning of the year. Parties and other activities during the year are included as part of caring for the children. Pastoral care is an essential part of every Chrysalis offering.

Jesus said, "When I was in prison you visited me." Helping Chrysalis in their ministry is one way we can serve Christ through our church.
