This Fall (and always) . . . Christ Lutheran Chooses Kindness

We are excited to rally this fall at Christ Lutheran as we lift up kindness in our community of faith and far beyond. Looking ahead toward a contentious election season, your Liturgical Planning Team (our worship planners!) met and considered how we might best approach difficult conversations and anxiety-producing situations. Their answer was to call us back to kindness and remind us of our common conviction to follow the biblical mandate to "love one another as Jesus first loved us." Throughout the fall we will consider the core values that help us live out Jesus' call upon each of us to love one another as we have been loved by him. We will explore humility, compassion, hope, gratitude, respect, generosity, faith, listening, grace, and love. Our children will become kindness ambassadors, receiving badges each week in Sunday School that reflect these core values. And in worship, we will have an opportunity to contribute to our "well of kindness," a little well that will sit at the front of our worship space. Each week during worship we will be able to write down ways we have practiced these values and times when we have been on the receiving end of someone else practicing these values. These moments of kindness that renew, transform, and inspire are not always grand gestures, but more often small acts that add up to a wave of change and a movement toward building community across division. On October 27, our Sunday morning classes (of all ages) will take a break and come together in a joint service project to pack meal kits for Plaza de Paz Respite Center as we demonstrate compassion and generosity. Faith University — Bible Based — September 8, 15, 22 9:30 a.m. in the Fellowship Hall

I have noticed a troubling trend within the world of Christianity . . . some Christian communities say they believe 100% in the Bible as the Word of God while deriding other Christian communities as rejecting God's sacred and holy word based upon their differing interpretation. They are positive that their understanding of scripture is the right one, and they are strong in this conviction. So strong, that those Christian communities accused of not believing in the Bible . . . have seemingly started to agree with this derision and acquiesce to their assessments, suggesting that they hold the Bible in less standing or see it as other than the holy Word of God.

I will never forget when Bishop Elizabeth Eaton, our presiding Bishop for the entire ELCA (Evangelical Lutheran Church in America), wrote the following in response to the Supreme Court's decision in 2015 announcing the right of same-gender couples to have equal access to marriage. She wrote, "For many members of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, this decision is a welcome sign of hope and a time for celebration. Other members of this church do not agree with the court's decision and remain deeply concerned because of their understanding of Scripture." While I want to be careful not to critique our Bishop too strongly for her words offered in a difficult and divisive moment, I did find myself wishing that the Bishop had written that the many members she described as celebrating were doing so because of *their* deeply held understandings of sacred scripture as well.

The truth is that many of us who believe that marriage is sacred regardless of the gender of the couple do so precisely because we hold fast to the Bible as the sacred and revealed Word of God. We do not choose to support same gender marriage *in spite of* the Bible. We choose to support same gender marriage *because* of the Bible. For three Sundays in September, join me as we look at scripture and what it says about our life together. We will consider biblical hermeneutics and look at some of the key issues of our day from a biblical perspective, including marriage, gender roles, divorce, immigration, and abortion. We will acknowledge differing points of view and interpretation, gaining broader respect for ourselves and others within these conversations. In the process, we will discover what it means to be Bible based.

You Are Invited to a Congregational Meeting to Call Deacon Lisa Diana, Minister of Mission and Outreach

After more than two decades of dedicating 20% of our congregation's Sunday offerings to local, Lutheran, and international non-profit ministries, Christ Lutheran is enhancing its benevolence mission to more deeply engage with the communities we serve by adding a new part-time staff member devoted to mission and outreach.

The Church Staff and Council unanimously and enthusiastically recommend a member of our own congregation to lead this initiative as Minister of Mission and Outreach. Deacon Lisa Diana has been a CLC member since 2010, along with her husband Joe and their children, Matthew and Sophia. Lisa was ordained an ELCA Deacon in June, 2022. Her educational credentials include a Bachelor of Arts in Psychology-Texas State University, Master of Science in Human Development and Family Studies-Texas Tech University, and Master of Arts in Christian Ministry-Luther Seminary.

Lisa has a servant's heart. Her first call as a deacon was with Plaza de Paz Respite Center for Migrants in San Antonio, one of Christ Lutheran's benevolence partners. Her involvement with immigration and support to asylum seekers has been a continuing thread throughout her volunteer work. She also is a member of WELCA's (Women of the ELCA) Project Radical Hospitality and serves on the Southwestern Texas Synod Council. She has been involved in outreach ministry at CLC, has taught Godly Play to our Sunday school children, serves as an assisting minister, and studies with the CLC Spanish class to better serve Spanish-speaking refugees.

Through all the challenges of recent decades, including the worldwide pandemic, Christ Lutheran has been unwavering in its commitment to lend financial support, along with prayers and volunteer action, to our benevolence partners. In fiscal year 2023-2024, we awarded \$129,595.71 to 24 organizations that are doing the Lord's work – transforming the lives of unhoused persons and families, teen mothers, immigrants, refugees, the poor, the hungry, seniors, impoverished individuals needing hospice care, and more.

Many of the organizations we support, and their compassionate, humanitarian missions, are dear to the hearts of our congregation. Lisa's work will strengthen our relationships with these benevolence partners to include advocacy and service projects involving our children, youth, and families. Lisa will link with organizations, people, and resources within and outside our congregation to seek avenues for engaging Christ Lutheran with new and existing mission partners in tangible ways so that we may better serve those who are most vulnerable.

Covering the first year's salary for this important position was made possible thanks to the generosity of our late friend Elward Reiss who made a gift in memory of her beloved husband Bernie Reiss, along with a gift from an anonymous donor. In subsequent years, the Council believes that the budgetary impact will be modest compared to the benefits to our congregation and the greater community.

Please join us on Sunday, September 1, following the 9:30 a.m. worship service, to lend your voice and vote to this process that will broaden our congregation's commitment to serving those outside our church family. This ministry will enrich our worship, our lives, and our fellowship as we embark on this unifying work together.

<u>1st - 3rd & 4th - 7th Grades:</u> Students will be using the Bible in a Year curriculum this year. This curriculum is Bible-driven and will provide the basic tools for reading and learning the Bible. Ms. Carrie, along with other parents, will be teaching these classes.

The Power of Your Offerings: You are Helping Children, the Homeless, Seniors, and Migrants

CLC's Benevolence Team and four of our benevolence partners were thrilled to learn that our congregation's generosity in Sunday worship offerings generated an additional \$12,547.89 for Christ Lutheran's benevolence work in fiscal year 2023-2024. The team has voted to allocate an additional \$3K each to the following four nonprofit organizations that are vetted and established CLC benevolence partners. The remaining \$547.89 will go into the Pastor's Discretionary Benevolence Fund for emergency aid.

Recipients of the additional \$3K each include Christian Assistance Ministry, Christian Senior Services-Meals on Wheels, Friends of Ngong Road, and Plaza de Paz.

Christian Assistance Ministry (CAM) will apply these funds to a \$100K August matching grant from the Wade Richmond Foundation to further CAM's dedication to serving at-risk children, families, veterans, seniors, and individuals with much-needed resources to folks who are in crisis. Services may include basics such as groceries, utility assistance, prescription assistance, bus passes, IDs, birth certificates, clothes, shoes, and more.

Christian Senior Services-Meals on Wheels, a longtime benevolence partner, delivers nutritious meals to homebound seniors, helping them stay healthy and remain independent in their homes. The need is great, as evidenced by the delivery of more than 24 million hot meals since opening in 1977. Each weekday, volunteers and staff visit more than 4,500 clients' homes in Bexar and surrounding counties to deliver nourishing food, goodwill . . . and friendship (a gift as welcomed as the meals).

Friends of Ngong Road in Nairobi, Kenya, lends educational support and hope to thousands of children whose already-impoverished lives have been upended by AIDS in their families. Some 50% are orphans and another 50% live with a surviving parent. Friends of Ngong Road help children receive an education, find jobs, support themselves, and assist their families in overcoming poverty. The children served by this charitable organization live primarily in Dagoretti where the median household income is under two dollars per day. This gift will give students regular access to using computers and offer multiple training programs that equip young people with the skills, knowledge and mindset to thrive in any future career.

Plaza de Paz respite center, a collaborative effort between the Southwestern Texas Synod of the ELCA and the Episcopal Diocese of West Texas, provides welcoming services for families and individuals seeking asylum. Services include meals, assistance with travel arrangements, personal hygiene care, emergency housing, and transportation within Bexar County to the airport or bus station.

When you, our dear and generous Christ Lutheran friends, share your resources through weekly worship gifts, you are transforming lives, bringing hope to the hopeless, and reminding recipients of your gifts that we are all one in Christ. We are so grateful, and these strangers whom we may never meet are uplifted by your kindness. More than 25 local, Lutheran, and international charitable organizations share 20% of Christ Lutheran's weekly worship offerings. The total distributed to our benevolence partners in 2023-2024: \$129,595.71! Isn't that a beautiful thing?

Meal Kits for Plaza de Paz

The Plaza de Paz Respite Center for migrants is in desperate need of shelf-stable, individually wrapped meal kits. These kits are useful as a backup when fresh food resources are unavailable. Even better, they are easy to pack for travel. The Center needs around 300 kits a month, so Christ Lutheran is undertaking the challenge to provide a month's worth of kits this fall. In September and October, we will be collecting items for the kits. You can stop by the CrossWay and visit our donation display starting Sunday, September 8. There you will find notes you can take, detailing a group of items we will need for the kit. Don't forget to sign the registration sheet so we can track who is giving what and make certain all items are covered. On Sunday, October 27, during education hour, we will have an all-congregation service project to pack these kits in Fellowship Hall. This will be a fun and faith-filled intergenerational service opportunity, where we can be witnesses of compassion and grace. Please join us!

CLC Benevolence Partner Corner: New Life Children's Center

New Life Children's Center is a residential treatment center for girls ages 11-17 who have experienced severe trauma in their lives. New Life is a mission of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA). Through multiple services that include counseling, education, and job training, New Life offers an avenue for girls to move into a future with hope, knowing they are loved and valued. This is a challenging mission that is accomplished in a variety of ways through the work of dedicated volunteers and staff.

The Director of Volunteers recently gave me an extensive tour of the campus and described the different offerings including education in the state-licensed school and job training, as well as essential counseling and spiritual guidance. On the campus of New Life Children's Center there are classrooms, a dormitory, and a cafeteria with outdoor seating available when the weather cooperates, and many other facilities. Every volunteer has gone through an extensive vetting process to ensure the safety of the girls.

The New Life campus has riverfront access to the Guadalupe River. The girls provide care for animals, including therapy horses, and they tend a bountiful garden. A beautiful, light-filled Lutheran chapel sits near the river. The chapel ministry provides an essential spiritual experience.

Christ Lutheran donated \$4,000 to New Life Children's Center in fiscal year 2023-24.
