From the Pastor

God Bless You . . .

Did somebody just sneeze? That's what we say, especially during the Mountain Cedar/Flu season, when someone lets go with an audible sneeze in public. We hear it often in February and March when winds may blow from the north, sending cedar pollen and all manner of allergens up our noses.

Historians of language speculate that ancient languages often had the same word for *wind*, *spirit*, and *breath*. Since sneezing involves the strongest expulsion of *breath* in human experience, it might just involve also the expulsion of one's *spirit*, or even the *Holy Spirit*, rendering one vulnerable to demons and threats from without. It was thought to be a safeguard to the sneezer's health and well-being to wish them God's blessing. Perhaps that's why in German-speaking cultures, one simply says *gesundheit*, or "health" to the one who expels all manner of (whatever) into shared breathing space. It may be meant for all!

"Blessing" means many things. "Bless her heart . . ." can be a prelude to a diss. "The Lord bless you and keep you . . ." can be the divine, sincere intent for all as worshipers depart a Sunday morning worship service. Matthew and Luke quote Jesus using the word quite deliberately in his Sermon on the Mount (Matthew 5) and the Sermon on the Plain (Luke 6). Jesus says:

Blessed are you who are poor . . . Blessed are you who are hungry . . . Blessed are you who weep now . . . Blessed are you when people hate you, exclude you, revile you. (Luke 6:20-22)

Such talk seems contradictory, or double-talk on human experience. No one seeks these things: poverty, hunger, sadness, or hate from others. Yet we reflected in our Faith University studies here at CLC in February on the work of Dr. Timothy Thorstenson, quoting St. John of the Cross from the late 1500s, that it can be in such times, dark times, even suffering times, that "we experience the potential for a deeper connection with God, with 'the divine space,' (resulting) in soul-transforming recognition of true transcendence."

This has been my experience in ministry. When times were the most austere and threatening in military life, when conditions were dark, that's when the most important work was done. When we "live into" the wounds life may impose on us, we can emerge toward greater intimacy and care for others when they become wounded. We learn at such times that we are "in this together."

Listen further to Jesus' words from Luke:

Woe to you who are rich . . . Woe to you who are full now . . . Woe to you who are laughing now . . . Woe to you when all speak well of you . . . Again, it sounds contradictory, for aren't these the things after which we all strive? I believe the "woes" are warnings, spiritual caution signs against imagining that the temporal illusions of wealth and power endure. Following Jesus means following a *different* path. He comes to us empty of worldly power and the promise of worldly "success" and bids us to follow him.

With political and even military dangers all around, it's the perfect time to remember that we follow Jesus. He came to "bless" and bring hope to those who had every earthly reason to be hopeless. As his church, we now have opportunity to be a "little Christ" to our neighbor. Jesus' commitment to "preach good news to the poor, recovery of sight to the blind . . . release to the captive" may not make you wealthy or fill your belly. "Living into" the challenges of our time may not bring laughter or make others always speak well of you. Hear instead Jesus' promise: *Rejoice in that day, and leap for joy!*

So if bad news is all you're hearing these days, hear also the good news: blessed are you! Holy are you! For Jesus has called you to *this* time and *this* place, to be his witnesses, to the ends of the earth.

Global Refuge Condemns False Accusations

As you've likely heard from the news, as well as from Pastor Leslie's sermon on February 9, Global Refuge and Lutheran Social Services have been targeted by the new administration, and falsely accused of "money laundering." Here we share with you the official response from Global Refuge:

Global Refuge condemns, in the strongest possible terms, the false accusations lodged against our humanitarian work. As a faith-based nonprofit, we have faithfully walked alongside legally admitted refugees and immigrants for more than 85 years. This includes Afghan allies who risked their lives to protect U.S. troops, as well as persecuted Christians, all of whom have been extensively vetted and approved by multiple U.S. government agencies before traveling to our country.

We also remain committed to caring for unaccompanied children forced to flee unimaginable circumstances in their home countries to seek safety in the United States. Across Democratic and Republican administrations, we have partnered with the U.S. government to protect vulnerable children, safeguard them against human trafficking, and safely reunify them with their parent(s) or guardian.

Rooted in our proud Lutheran heritage, Global Refuge and our dedicated network of providers stand ready to assist the new administration in welcoming families who need to resettle in our country, helping ensure they learn our language, secure jobs that help our economy grow, and quickly become vital contributors to communities. To do otherwise would run contrary to the spirit of our Christian faith, America's identity as a nation of immigrants, and our role as a global humanitarian leader.

Lenten Offering - Global Refuge

Needed: Your Hearts of Mercy to Support Global Refuge

Our Lenten theme appeals to "Hearts of Mercy," as we reach out in compassion to address the desperate needs of imperiled ministries during these tumultuous times. Our Hearts of Mercy are particularly needed today for our friends at Global Refuge who are battling misinformation, false accusations, and lost federal funding, yet remain determined to help the refugees who rely on them for resettlement assistance.

As the designated recipient of our Lenten worship funds this year, we have selected Global Refuge, formerly Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Services (LIRS), a nonprofit ministry serving newcomers who are seeking safety, support, and a share in the American dream. For 85 years, they have welcomed refugees from many countries in turmoil, upholding a legacy of compassion and grace for people in crisis.

They walk alongside individuals, families, and children as they embark on new lives in the United States. Their work in refugee resettlement includes welcome and respite services for asylum seekers, economic empowerment and employment, and family unification for unaccompanied children. To date, they have served over 800,000 people from around the globe.

Two years ago, Global Refuge opened a San Antonio office to better serve refugees coming through Texas. To date, this local affiliate has helped launch over 200 individuals, and at present, they are accompanying 74 refugees who are counting on outreach and assistance.

What do they need to continue their work after federal funds were suddenly halted? They need everything. Money. Prayers. Volunteers. Advocacy. Due to the slashed funding, they have had to do the heartbreaking act of letting staff go because they cannot pay them.

Andrew Steele, Global Refuge Chief Development and Mobilization Officer, says, "We are committed to keeping our San Antonio office open. We need more connections to local funders, to churches, and to Lutherans in particular. There is no other Lutheran resettlement operation in Texas. The mission is critical, and the needs are enormous."

They are assisting families with rent and food and helping them find jobs and complete the paperwork needed to gain asylum status. They are reuniting families. In 2023, 125,000 unaccompanied children came to the Southern border alone. Andrew says, "Reunification keeps families from enduring the horrors of human trafficking." He notes that Congress appropriated the funds for their operations last fall, yet the sudden stoppage has left them without reimbursement for work already completed, and insufficient funds to pay staff or help refugees.

Global Refuge is in crisis. It requires Hearts of Mercy. Our congregation has a 93-year history of sharing its merciful hearts with those in need, as Jesus would have us do. These words from Matthew 25:35-40 are our guidepost in Lent, and in everyday life. "For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you clothed me, I was sick and you visited me, I was in prison and you came to me."

FAQ About Wednesday Night Dinners

Our church family has begun hosting Wednesday night dinners in the Fellowship Hall. This program began because our children's choirs' families enjoyed spending time together after singing, and it continues to grow and expand to create connections across the church.

We're sharing some of the most common questions we've received about Wednesday night dinners, and we hope you'll come out soon to join us for a fun evening of fellowship!

What are we doing?

We are gathering for dinner and fellowship - as simple as that! During certain times of the year, there may be additional programming on campus (for example, Lenten services coming up soon!). However, currently we are just enjoying the time to be together and get to know one another.

What are we eating?

Dinners are provided and prepared by the church community. Each month, we maintain a SignUpGenius and work together to prepare simple, kid-friendly meals - soup, pasta, tacos, etc.

How much does it cost?

We are keeping costs down for the program by asking church members to provide a main course, a side, a dessert, etc. When we have many church community members providing the meals, we are able to make funds stretch farther (a very loaves-and-fishes mindset!).

Who is invited?

Everyone! We initially began meeting because our children's choirs' families enjoyed having dinner together at nearby restaurants on Wednesday nights. However, as this activity gained popularity, our group quickly outgrew the space at some of our favorite restaurants (imagine EZ's packed with Christ Lutheran kids!).

We really would enjoy seeing more people from across the church join us so we can continue getting to know each other and enjoy one another's company. You are also welcome to invite friends and family outside of Christ Lutheran to connect them with our community (food is great for bringing people together!).

How can I help?

The number one way you can help is just to be there! We really want to see more people from across the church and community joining together on Wednesday nights. It could be a great time for small group gatherings, catching up with friends, meeting new friends, etc.

Other ways to help include:

- Providing a main course, side or dessert for the evening (see the monthly SignUpGenius above)
- Helping to prepare food in the kitchen (from 5:30 p.m. to 6:15 p.m.)
- Helping to clean up following dinner (usually from 7:00 p.m. to 7:30 p.m.)

- Providing a freewill donation to help support the program


CLC STAFFING UPDATE

Deacon Lisa has been journeying alongside the family, and Christ Lutheran began helping the family nine months ago. Andreina, Osmar, and their three children: Ashley (18), Andrea (16), and Dilan (5) left Venezuela because of the corrupt and unlivable conditions. They hoped for better opportunities for themselves and their family and made the long journey here. They have faced many challenges since arriving here in the fall of 2023, but they also have made much progress. They have received permission to apply for asylum, get work permits, and enroll their children in school. These are all big steps. They are very motivated. We have agreed to help with part of their rent and bills for the next several months while they are trying to find work. If you are able to help Andreina with any job opportunities, please contact Deacon Lisa Diana. One of Andreina's goals is to learn English. She brought some items for our bake sale on Sunday and sat for a little while in the service, afterward telling us how much she wants to learn.

Thank you again for your support. This is such a hard time for refugees and asylum seekers in the U.S., and we're so glad CLC is welcoming them. When we do this, we are also welcoming Christ into our church.
